






FEARLESSLY FERST-GEN





Upward Bound is federally mandated to serve students who are low-income and first-generation, requiring 66% of eligible students to identify as both.

HIGH STANDARDS HIGH SUPPORT

63% participants will have a GPA above 2.5 at the end of the school year

Daily after school tutoring, weekly grade monitoring, and multiple opportunities for supplemental instruction help students achieve grade point averages at or above this standard.

87% of project students will continue on to the next grade or will have graduated from high school.

Consistent monitoring of **school attendance** and required **weekly check-ins** support students in making the necessary progress to advance on to the next year or earn their diploma.

62% of all current and prior Upward
Bound participants will enroll in college
the fall immediately following high
school graduation.

Proactive admissions, registration, and financial aid advisement supports seniors throughout their final year of high school, preparing them for the next chapter in their educational lives.

Upward Bound students are held to high academic and participation standards. These standards are achieved through the high level of support provided by Upward Bound staff throughout the Academic and Summer sessions.

48% of Upward Bound seniors will have proficient scores in math and English Language Arts.

Intentional programming around **PSAT and SAT preparation**, in addition to accessing alternative paths toward **demonstrating proficiency** ensure all students have the ability to succeed.

48% of all current and prior Upward Bound participants who graduated from high school will complete a rigorous program of study.

Embedded Upward Bound advisors at Central and Grand Junction High School challenge students to **enroll in difficult courses** that provide a strong foundation for future college coursework.

38% of all participants who enrolled in college following high school graduation will graduate with an associates or bachelor's degree within six years.

Connecting graduates with campus resources like TRIO Student Support Services, faculty and staff advisors, and peer-led organizations develops the necessary support to succeed in college.












PERFORMANCE OVERVIEW

As a Department of Education grant, CMU Upward Bound is eligible to receive "Prior Experience Points" in years 2, 3, and 4 of the 5-year grant cycle. These points are awarded when a program exceeds their goals and benefit the program when re-applying at the end of the grant cycle in 2027.

CMU Upward Bound earned <u>all possible</u> <u>prior experience points</u> in 2023-2024.



SUMMER ACADEMY HIGHLIGHTS

17 students dedicated six weeks of their summer vacation to participating in the Upward Bound Summer Academy.

The first four weeks were spent at CMU where students engaged in daily coursework in core subjects. Students then moved into campus dorms for a week prior to departing on a week-long college road trip across Colorado!

ACCOMPLISHMENTS AND OPPORTUNITIES

The second year of Upward Bound at Colorado Mesa University and Mesa County School District 51 provided new opportunities for students and staff to grow.

Accomplishments Include:

- In March 2024, two staff members attended the annual **Council for Opportunity in Education Policy Seminar** in Washington D.C. where they shared our student's stories and successes with elected officials from Colorado.
- In April 2024, an Upward Bound student from Central High School presented at the annual Colorado ASPIRE Conference, hosted at Colorado Mesa University. This student was the only high school student in the state selected as a conference presenter.
- In June 2024, two students--one from Grand Junction High School and one from Central High School--were selected to attend the annual National Student Leadership Congress hosted at American University in Washington, D.C.. Here, students learned about the legislative process, created their own mock legislation, and met with elected officials at the U.S. Capitol.

Challenges Include:

- Our federal grant award covers 100% of Upward Bound's operating budget. Though
 Upward Bound has strong bipartisan support from national legislators, federal budgets
 seldom keep up with the challenges of high inflation. Inflation has increased everything
 from the monthly cost of staff benefits to the food we provide students during summer
 programming. With budgets remaining "flat funded", meaning a 0% increase between
 grant years, we got savvy, seeking out free or low-cost options for student-based
 services in order to navigate rising costs.
- We welcomed two new advisors to the Upward Bound team in the 2023-2024 grant year as previous staff new opportunities within the local school district and at CMU. Our new team members brought great energy and valuable skills to our program, but the hiring process is difficult, especially for students who built strong, trusting relationships with previous advisors. By including students in the interview and hiring process, we helped ensure that our new team members not only aligned with our program's values, but the process gave students insight into interviewing skills and the steps of applying for a job!
